Judith Butler Johnson Schweikert (Judi) passed away on December 9, 2013, in Park City, UT, having just turned 74. She was born Nov. 24, 1939, in Laconia, NH to Carl and Florence Johnson (née Dunningham).

She is survived by her husband of 52 years, Daniel Schweikert, and their three children: Eric, Karl, and Kristen Schweikert Humphrey. She is also survived by her five grandchildren: Anne, Edward, Margaret, George, and Alden.

After growing up in Winthrop, MA, Judi earned a BA in English from Smith College, and MAs in English from URI and in counseling from SJSU. She married Dan on August 12, 1961. In the early years they lived in Mystic, CT, and Berkeley Heights, NJ.

In 1980 they moved to Colorado Springs, CO. Judi became head of the CS Fine Arts Center volunteers. In 1988 the family moved to San Jose, CA, where Judi became Director of the Noyce Foundation Scholarship program and sang in the SJSU Chorale.

Judi and Dan moved to Park City, UT, in 2004, where she skied and volunteered with enthusiasm at over a dozen organizations, including PCMR (as a mountain host), Sundance, PEO, PC Performing Arts Fdn., the Utah Symphony Chorus, and, as in most places she lived, church choir. Most recently she worked for the PC History Museum.

Services will be held at 2:00 pm today, December 13, at the Park City Community Church.

Maytag's Dependable Leader Awarded To Murray Philanthropist Murray Journal, November 6, 2013

When Art Pasker entered a bid to design the Boys & Girl's Club in Murray, he was pretty certain he'd get the job, especially when he promised to do the job for free. That was in 1974, and Pasker hasn't stopped contributing his time and talthe ents to

program dear to his heart. His time as a Boys & Girls Club member in Colorado influenced his life so positively, that he decided to pay it forward.

During a surprise event on Oct. 9, Pasker was named the 2013 Maytag Dependable Leader Award, recognizing his 40 years of work with the club.

"There's nobody more deserving for this award, around the entire nation, than Art Pasker," Boys & Girls Club of South Valley Executive Director Bob Dunn said. "He has changed lives. There's no question about that."

The Maytag Repairman himself stopped by the club to deliver the

award to Pasker, along with a check for \$20.000. Pasker was only one of 24 leaders across the country to receive the award this year, and he said the money will go to continue programs that keep the youth of Murray safe and excited about education. Visibly emotional, Pasker accepted the award, promising to continue his support of the club's programs.

"I'm very surprised. My wife encouraged me to wear a tie today, but I didn't listen to her," Pasker said. "I don't know why I've been blessed financially to do these things. It's great to have people in the background to support these kids."

Not only did Pasker design the club's facilities for free. he used his influence to persuade contractors and vendors to donate \$500,000 in time and materials to the project. He also creates still-life paintings that he donates to the club's auction each year. Additionally, Pasker has set up a charitable

trust in 2010

that provides the organization with more than \$60,000 in revenue annually-and he purchased a shuttle bus to local school children wouldn't have to walk in bad weather to get to the club. He and his wife Martha contribute to several organizations in the Murray area.

Jaci McKeage was only 13 when Pasker took her under his wing. She attended the club after her mother was sent to prison, and her siblings were separated. McKeage went to live with her grandmother, Janet Moore, who worked at the Boys & Girls Club. That's where she met Pasker, and learned how much he valued education.

In a letter read by Moore during the Maytag event, McKeage wrote, "Art called me to meet him in his office. He showed me his list of grandchildren he was putting through college, He wrote my name on that list and said he was going to include me. He told me about his road through college and the hard work it was going to take. I left his office in tears. No one had ever offered me a hand up like that. I started my studies the next semester."

With Pasker's faith in her abilities, McKeage was named the 2005 Youth of the Year, and became the first person in her family to graduate from high school. She was so touched by the Pasker's generosity that she is now saving money to pay for her brother's college tuition.

"Art Pasker is truly a dependable leader who selflessly gives his time and efforts to Boys & Girls Clubs of South Valley and we are proud to see him recognized with this incredible award from Maytag," Dunn said. "Through the Dependable Maytag Leader Award, Art Pasker will continue making a positive impact in our community and build upon our reach. We are grateful to Maytag for supporting our organization's efforts to serve young people and make a difference in their lives "
